An Act of Kindness

These past fifteen months for our nation have been among the most unsettling in many decades. Times are tough. We as a people are experiencing financial, social and political changes that many folks have not seen before in their lifetimes. As a result fear, anxiety, and uncertainty are common emotions among millions of Americans. Many people are crabby, down or stressed. What can you and I as Christians do to help folks in these difficult times?

God give us some very good and yet simple advice for being a help to our family, friends and neighbors. ***“be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another just as God for Christ’s sake has forgiven you.”*** (Ephesians 4:32) In order words as we have been loved by God through Jesus Christ we can love others in like fashion!

The beauty of ***kindness*** is that one simple gesture can make a difference. Kindness is something anyone can do regardless of their age, gender or financial status. ***“No act of kindness, however small, is ever wasted.”*** — Aesop

I’m challenging you to take God’s directive in the Bible and do something kind for someone today. It can be a friend, family member or a complete stranger. It doesn’t have to cost tons of money, so don’t let that stop you. Brighten someone’s day. Bonus points if it’s anonymous. You’ll be happy you did.

Here are a few suggestions:

Thank-you note: Write a thank-you note to someone today. There are so many people we encounter in the course of our day who might not feel appreciated. They don’t expect thanks, but they are certainly deserving of it. If you don’t feel up to writing, then give someone a sincere compliment.

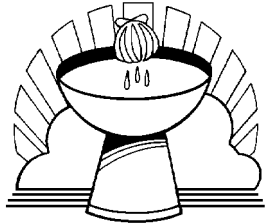
Loose change: Leave some loose change somewhere. It can be in a vending or gum-ball machine, pay phone or toll plaza. One lady I read about, **Christina** from New York shared: *“I gave up my quarter in the grocery cart so a woman wouldn’t have to fumble to find one in the cold. It made me feel great, and her surprise at the small kindness was super.”* Feeling more generous? Leave a big tip next time you dine out, or leave coupons on a grocery-store shelf.

Listen: When we ask someone how they are, how often does our attention trail off? Take time to really listen to someone. Seek out someone who is lonely, and spend time with him or her.

Give: Think of someone to send an anonymous gift to. Or do an act of charity. You can donate your time, items or skill. There are people who will truly benefit from this selfless act. Zion has groups that quilt blankets, create Braille books, staff Bethesda Thrift Shop downtown Hopkins, spend 2 ½ hours on Wednesdays with grade school age children in an after school program, etc. Collectively, you can give so much.

Smile: Make it a point to smile the day away. No one wants to see unhappy people. Refrain from being negative. You can help lift others simply by smiling. It's infectious.

Food: Give a treat or meal to someone as a surprise today.

Be neighborly: Share a plant or vegetables from your garden, shovel a walkway, offer your driveway if they have guests, bring their trash barrels to or from the curb, spend time talking with them, or share books.

Look around: Seek other ways to be kind, comforting, concerned and helpful. Take the focus away from your busy life and think about others. **Rose**, who lives in Florida, shared: "If there are loose shopping carts blocking other spaces I'll pick up one or two. Sometimes, I'll take them to the corral and sometimes up to the doors. Once I parked in one of my 'way out' parking spaces, and a guy was coming back past all these empty spaces to one right next to my car. He grabbed two carts and pushed them to a corral. I was leaving my car and picking up two. We just laughed and nodded at each other. It was really nice to see someone doing the same sort of thing."

God has been so good to us as His sons and daughters in faith. May God encourage you and bless you as you seek to share that goodness and "**be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another just as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you.**" (Ephesians 4:32)

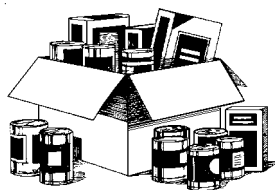

Media and the Teen Brain

The media have the greatest impact on brains during growth spurts. The teen brain is not the same as an adult brain. For example, nicotine, alcohol and drugs affect the teen brain differently because the brain is still under construction.

If teenagers spend their waking hours immersed in violent, crude, and lewd images their brains will be influenced by these experiences. Instead of shaping their brains with positive attitudes and values they'll wire their brains with disrespect and degradation. So what's a parent to do? Here's a survival guide on media for you and your teen:

- Make sure you have sensible rules limiting the amount of time your kids spend with media.
- Keep the video games, TVs, and computers out of kids' bedrooms.
- Understand and use the media rating systems.
- Talk with your kids about music lyrics or video images you find objectionable.
- Make clear rules concerning Internet use and monitor your child's use.


The entertainment media probably already play a big role in the life of your kid. Even if your kid drenches his brain in violence and sexually explicit images every day, it's not too late. The time is always right to help your teen develop good media habits, even if his brain is in the midst of a major growth spurt. Making good media choices when the brain is still growing can go a long way to making a healthy life later on.

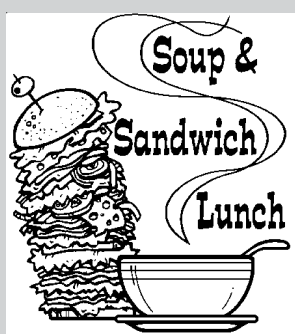

Understanding Other Cultures

Last month we celebrated each Sunday with a Global Ministry Theme in Worship and Sunday School. We saw that other nations celebrate their faith in Christ with different sounding music and languages. And as believers in Jesus Christ we all, world wide, come together as the body of Christ. Here are some thoughts and suggestions to help children become more familiar and comfortable with people from other cultures.

From their earliest years, children need to understand about other cultures and learn to accept people who are different from themselves. Even toddlers can begin to appreciate playing side by side with other children who may have a different language or another color of skin. Look around in school, churches, and shopping malls! We are so blessed to have the diversity! Young children are most curious and receptive to new experiences and it is an excellent idea to provide them with many ways to see the world as diverse while they are young.

We want our children to see the world as God sees it. Use these ideas to help your child develop a positive, open attitude toward other cultures.

- Have a family of another culture in your home for a meal.
- Visit a restaurant of another culture and enjoy a meal. There are many in our area.
- Encourage your child to play with a friend from another culture. Invite him over to your house to play. All you have to do is take a walk down our school halls and see the diversity.
- Make friends with a family of another culture and enjoy taking day trips together, just to a local park, landmark, garden, etc.
- Play games from other cultures.
- Visit a church which offers a Christian Worship service of a different Culture.
- Become friends with a missionary family from another culture. Write letters to them and share your own and families faith experiences.

My own children loved to sit with me and look at pictures of how people from other cultures dress, the food they eat, the schools they attend (if they could), the houses they live in, etc.



Please be careful not to convey negative stereotypes in your home about other cultures.

I wonder if we fully realize how much God loves all people of the world, not just those who look and act like we do. Give your child the wonderful gift of God's global view of the world.

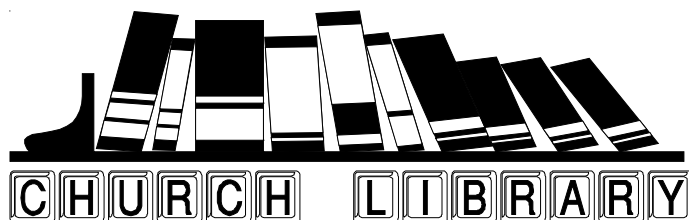

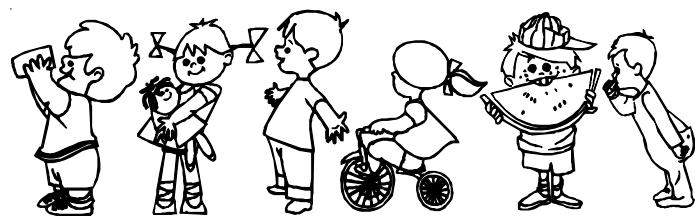
Pre-K
